We also supported the Table de concertation sur la faim et le développement social en Outaouais, which developed the Carte communautaire de la faim, a tool that maps out the local food supply and existing initiatives in order to better respond to the need.

The values of support, solidarity and empathy remain at the heart of our action and, not to forget the rigour that drives us—each and every day—to improve our practices and judiciously invest the donations we receive in those areas of need that are the most pressing. And there, where they will have the greatest impact.



Following the Centraide reorganization in Québec during the year, Centraide Outaouais took in the nine agencies from the MRC de la Vallée-de-la-Gatineau.

This tightly knit community distinguishes itself by its community spirit, where the residents are heavily involved in the Centraide campaign and a whole host of other activities, and hold seats on boards of directors and agencies that provide for the well-being of the entire population. We should also mention the dedication of the regional campaign team, staffed by Anik Beauseigle, Sonny Constantineau and Monia Lirette.

Food security remains the most serious issue in the area and there are three agencies that work hard to meet the needs of the vulnerable members of the community. The rate of school dropouts, the isolation of seniors and the social integration of persons with disabilities are other major concerns.

The **nine agencies** that we support never stop showing their ingeniousness and creativity. Here are some examples:

Mani-Jeunes is an agency that criss-crosses the area with its two highly visible vans, providing entertainment for youth in areas where there are no activities available. Sports, art and information workshops are some of the many initiatives that allow young people to develop better social skills, acquire a sense of independence and encourage community participation.

Suicide prevention is at the heart of the mission of **Suicide Détour**. Since studies have shown that spending time in nature helps reduce stress and improve mood, the agency arranges outdoor activities, primarily kayaking and canoeing.

I am the mother of a boy with a number of learning disabilities. At the time, I was told that he was probably never going to be able to read or write. I couldn't envisage that. I needed resources and support. So I turned to the Association québécoise des troubles d'apprentissage de l'Outaouais (AQETA). As soon as I got there, I quickly fell in love with them. There, they helped me better understand my child and made me better equipped. Elric was able to make friends with others just like him, all while improving at school. They changed Elric's life and mine too. Today, I am very proud to say that he is able to read and write very well.

In the face of the region's high cost of living—which continues to climb even higher—the well-being of young people depends on academic success (see....)

87% of the families supported by Équipe Soutien Famille have children who are experiencing a developmental delay or social, emotional or behavioural problems;

The percentage of persons between the ages of 25 and 64 who do not have a high school diploma dropped from 23.5% to 14.7% in the Outaouais. For this segment of the population, in the MRCs of Pontiac and the Vallée-de-la-Gatineau 1 person out of 4 does not have a high school diploma.

RESULTS

The struggle against prejudice, racism and bullying is a fight that goes on every day. **Talent de la cité pour la coexistence** is a cultural initiative established by the Association des femmes immigrantes de l'Outaouais that is designed to provide an expression space for about a dozen young people from underprivileged neighbourhoods with unexplored talents. Through their lens, they have been able to skilfully and sensitively share their learned experiences and their perceptions on interculturalism, coexistence and social integration by creating photos and videos based on the themes of living together and the richness of diversity.

Le LAB is a place of artistic expression and creation intended primarily for young people between the ages of 16 and 30 whose lives are at risk or who are living with the realities of drug addiction, homelessness or social exclusion. Paint, charcoal, clay, recycled materials, percussion instruments and guitars are some of the many means of expression made available to young people to help them develop their creative potential, self-confidence and a sense of belonging to the community. In total, le LAB hosted 4,646 persons, 452 of whom were there for the first time.

Allez hop, on bouge ! Sports and academic success go handin-hand and this is why les maisons de jeunes du Pontiac encourage and motivate young people to exercise. They enable especially youths from age 12 to 17 to participate in various sports, including inter-house competitions. Soccer and softball tournaments brought together some 700 participants as part of the inter-municipality sports program. They ran, jumped and outdid themselves in an atmosphere of friendly competition bringing awareness of the benefits of sports! Les Maisons des jeunes du Pontiac organize the inter-municipal sports program which sees over 700 soccer and softball players participating in their favourite sport.

IMPROVING LIVING CONDITIONS

When I was 25 years old, I contracted HIV from an infected needle. I did not understand anything. The worker explained that If I didn't take my meds, I would have only five years left to live. So I came to the Bureau Régional Action Sida (BRAS) for help. They mentored me. I had a chance to talk about my situation with support workers and with others who also have HIV. I was able to verbalize all my pain. At the time, I was using a lot and my illness had advanced. And they BRAS helped me accept my condition and understand that life goes on. Without their services, I would be dead.

RESULTS

The group **Au cœur des aînés du Pontiac**, which was founded by the Maison de la famille du Pontiac, allows members to build relationships and break down their isolation. Nutrition, well-being, arts and crafts, cooking and stress management are all subjects discussed in various workshops. Last year, 700 seniors participated in their activities. This is a valuable and unifying initiative with regard to the well-being of a segment of the population that is sometimes neglected.

Homeless women and sex-trade workers live on the margins of society. Established three years ago, the **Rue-Elles** initiative is intended to help break down their isolation, welcome them into a safe space and offer them a broad range of services. Close to 2,000 women were able to come together and establish relationships through weekly suppers where various subjects are discussed, and collective kitchens and cultural activities are offered each month. In their marginalized lives, Rue-Elles offers them a degree of normalcy.

Tenants, get involved! In the eight apartment buildings run by **Mon Chez Nous**, residents participate in democratic living and decision making by getting involved with the tenants' committee. This means developing their independence, housing skills, knowledge of their rights and obligations as tenants and even organizing activities—all elements that foster the social reintegration of youths, adults and families.

BUILDING SUPPORTIVE COMMUNITIES

In 2006, I left Ontario and moved to the l'Île de Hull neighbourhood. I was alone with my child. In walking around the neighbourhood I came across the Enfants de l'Espoir de Hull community centre. Seeing the children playing in the yard, I didn't hesitate to knock on the door. I was really made to feel welcome. I explained my situation to them and the loneliness that I was experiencing. My little boy and I started to attend their workshops and family activities. I liked getting involved and investing my time in the centre as a volunteer, so much that I became its general manager.

DID YOU KNOW?

Community centres and **youth homes** play a significant role in integrating newcomers, as well as citizens coming from other cities or provinces.

In our 12 homes there are some **thirty devoted employees** and **360 volunteers** who work hard to create a warm and welcoming space for hundreds of individuals who are often distraught and without the resources they need to deal head-on with change and the unknown associated with a rejection or a move.

Welcoming committees, neighbourhood entertainment, mobile libraries, women's groups, youth work coops, and community kitchens and refrigerators are all initiatives that shout loudly: "Welcome to our place, welcome to YOUR place!"

DES RÉSULTATS

They're there, on the ground, getting involved and volunteering in the community! Last year, youth from the maisons de Prévention César in MRC Papineau volunteered at 23 festivals, fairs and gatherings. Always highly visible, you see them participating enthusiastically at car washes, welcoming or guiding visitors and organizing fund-raising drives, among others.

Do you know where the food deserts are in the Outaouais? Where the grocery stores and dépanneurs are? Depending on where you shop, what about the cost of the average grocery basket? You'll find the answers on the Carte sur la faim (hunger map)! The Table de concertation sur la faim et le développement social en Outaouais, working closely with Centraide Outaouais, has created a map showing accessibility to food resources in the region. Since food security is a huge issue, we wanted to support this research and action initiative, which is designed to identify the players on the ground and find solutions.

More and more, distress in the workplace is a subject that is in the news. In an effort at prevention, Centraide Outaouais has for several years now been supporting support networks in factories and unionized workplaces. Prevention through listening, along with the presence of trained colleagues who are ready to provide counselling to persons experiencing distress using the best resources available. This is an invaluable initiative and Centraide is firmly behind it!





PRIX COUP DE CŒUR - ENTRE DEUX ROUES

This prize is awarded to the one agency that has distinguished itself by its initiative and its creativity. This can be for taking things in a new direction, a new project or approach that would help participants reach their goals.

Established in 1993, **Entre Deux Roues** is a centre that provides employment and respite activities for persons living with multiple severe disabilities and their families. Their enthusiastic team includes support workers, attendants and volunteers. Together, they offer a quality service and a whole host of activities to help persons with reduced mobility come out of their isolation and become socially liberated. Their employees invest a lot of time and themselves into their work! Congratulations to Entre Deux Roues, an organization that excels within its community!

PRIX MARIE-FAUVELLE - JAZZ APÉRO

This award was established in memory of a woman of deep conviction and determined action, one of Centraide Outaouais's most valued workers.
